What's Keeping Us Busy

Joe Scarborough Speaks Out About His Scholarship to Attend 18th Int'l AIDS Conference in Austria

Every two years, the International AIDS Society holds a conference that brings together some of the world's leading scientists, doctors, service providers, advocates and PWAs to address the AIDS pandemic on a global scale. This year, the XVIII International AIDS Conference will be held in Vienna, Austria (July 17-23, 2010) and, thanks to a generous scholarship from the National AIDS Housing Coalition (NAHC), I will be part of the International AIDS Housing Roundtable (IAHR). The IAHR is a set of satellite meetings and workshops organized and facilitated by HIV/AIDS housing providers, advocates and consumers to address the role that housing plays in the treatment and prevention of HIV/AIDS worldwide. The National AIDS Housing Coalition awarded 10 scholarships to advocates from around the world to attend the conference and formulate the IAHR workshops. Of those 10 scholarships, I was lucky enough to receive the only one in the U.S. The nine remaining scholarships went to Costa Rica, Saint Lucia, Australia, Panama, Uganda, Nigeria, the Philippines and Kenya, with Kenya receiving two.

It is an honor to be chosen to participate in such an important event, and I am proud to represent both the HIV/AIDS and housing communities here in Delaware and the United States. In the past three years I have been able to expand my advocacy from local budget hearings to international issues thanks to the support of the Delaware HIV Consortium, Homeless Planning Council of Delaware, and the Delaware Housing Coalition, as well as the National AIDS Housing Coalition. It just goes to show what a Red Ribbon Advocate can do.

Making Changes Together - Planning Council and Policy Committee Working Hand-in-Hand

The Delaware HIV Consortium's two major standing committees—Planning Council and Policy Committee—have a major impact on the provision of HIV/AIDS services in Delaware. Traditionally, Planning Council members monitor the disease and available services through studies, gaps analyses, and creation of long-range prevention and treatment plans that guide the allocation of funding statewide. In fact, Planning Council just recently completed the 2010-2014 Comprehensive HIV Prevention Plan and Statewide Coordinated Statement of Need (Comprehensive Plan). On an on-going basis, the work of the Policy Committee complements that of Planning Council. While Planning Council monitors services and needs, Policy Committee takes an additional step and advocates for changes at the local, state and federal level. Most recently, Policy Committee was intricately involved in advocating for (a) implementation of the successful pilot Needle Exchange Program in the City of Wilmington and (b) recognition locally and nationally of the fact that stable, affordable housing is an essential component in the prevention and treatment of HIV/AIDS.

Moving forward into 2010, Planning Council and Policy Committee have started an exciting initiative. Through ad hoc work groups comprised of interested members and invited experts in varying fields, the committees are collaborating on a series of White Papers. Topics for the papers emerged from the Comprehensive Plan, were suggested by the Division of Public Health, or were recommended by members of Planning Council and Policy Committee:

- Making HIV screening available in all high school-based Wellness Centers Implementing routine opt-out HIV testing
- Continuing/expanding the Needle Exchange Program

- Legalizing medical marijuana laws in Delaware
- Including "disabilities" as a preference for subsidized housing programs
- Providing HIV prevention education in all high schools and youth detention centers
- Addressing substance abuse treatment and mental health issues

Each White Paper will reflect a problem statement, a review of current literature and available research, an analysis of the various stakeholders, and a summary of potential remedies that are suitable for Delaware. As each paper is done, supporters will be enlisted to "sign-on". The White Paper then will be utilized to educate, or initiate discussion with key stakeholders.

Ad hoc groups have already met in March regarding two White Paper topics: implementing routine opt-out HIV testing and continuing/expanding the Needle Exchange Program. It is too early to provide information regarding progress on those papers. Subsequent newsletters, however, will include summaries regarding their statuses, as well as that of any other topic.

Delaware HIV Consortium Participates in National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day Event



The Faith Community Partnership recently sponsored its 9th Annual National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day Conference on Sunday, February 21. It was a well-attended event despite having been cancelled earlier in the month due to snow.

This year's theme of "HIV/AIDS Prevention—A Choice & A Lifestyle" was reflected in musical presentations, an inspirational keynote speech by Reverend Aaron R. Moore, updates from the Division of Public Health, and tributes to local heroes.

More than any other racial/ethnic group in the US, Blacks account for more new HIV infections, AIDS cases, people estimated to be living with HIV, and HIV related deaths. Even though Blacks make up 13% of the US population, they account for about half (49%) of the people who get HIV and AIDS.

HIV Travel Entry Ban Lifted

On January 4, 2010 the US lifted a 22-year travel ban which had stopped all individuals with HIV/AIDS from entering the country. President Barack Obama said the ban was not compatible with US plans to be a leader in the fight against the disease.

This entry ban was originally placed into effect in 1987 when there was little information on how HIV is spread. Only a few countries worldwide prohibit HIV positive travelers from crossing their borders, and the US has been the only Western country to uphold this discriminatory policy. Last year, Congress finally repealed the law mandating the travel ban, and the Obama Administration was able to remove the remaining regulatory barriers.

Thanks to the change in policy the 2012 International AIDS Conference will be held in Washington, D.C., a first for this global summit to be held in the US. By 2012, the US says it will have a National HIV/AIDS Strategy in place for the first time in its history.
